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#### STATISTICAL SUMMARY

#### BACKGROUND

Take care when comparing these statistics with those quoted in other publications. Different data collection timeframes may have been used, or information may have been obtained from different sources, or using different counting methods.

The information provided in this statistical supplement relating to the Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS) Prisoner Census is from the preliminary data supplied to ABS for the NT, some differences may occur between figures in this report and the final figures published by the ABS.

The basis for offence reporting is the Most Serious Offence (MSO) for the episode as recorded in the Integrated Justice Information System (IJIS).

The values quoted for components of a daily average may not sum to the total daily average. This is due to rounding errors inherent in the display format chosen for the daily averages.

New data extraction procedures and counting rules used for processing Community Corrections data were implemented during the 2001-02 reporting process. Hence, some of the Community Corrections figures published prior to the 2001-02 financial year are not directly comparable to this year's figures.

A new approach was adopted during 2002-03 to reporting the aggregate sentences of persons in custody. Hence, some of the aggregate sentence length figures published prior to the 2002-03 financial year are not directly comparable to this year's figures.

#### **CASELOAD OVERVIEW**

On 30 June 2004, the Northern Territory Correctional Services caseload was 1,982 distinct people, either undertaking a community based program or in custody in a correctional institution. This is estimated as 951 per 100,000<sup>1</sup> persons in the Northern Territory.




Figure 1 Northern Territory Correctional Services caseload as at 30 June 2004.

#### **ADULT PRISONERS**

#### **Population**

The daily average number of prisoners held in adult correctional institutions in the Northern Territory in 2003-04 was 719, which was slightly higher than the previous year (715). As can be seen in the following figure, the prison population has generally been increasing over the past 16 years, with a marked increase during the period 1995-96 to 1997-98.




Figure 2 Yearly daily average adult prisoners from 1988-89 to 2003-04.

The minimum and maximum number of prisoners that were held in custody in an adult correctional institution in the Northern Territory on any day during 2003-04 was 683 and 756 respectively. The average occupancy level of the combined prisons was 90% during the year.

#### Receptions

There were 2,133 receptions into Northern Territory adult correctional institutions during 2003-04, an increase of 6% from the previous year. These receptions involved 1,690 distinct persons.

#### **Imprisonment Rates**

The rate of imprisonment<sup>2</sup> of adults in the Northern Territory for 2003-04 is estimated to be 520 per 100,000 adults, which continues to be significantly higher than in other jurisdictions. For comparison, the national rate of imprisonment is estimated as 150 per 100,000 adults.




Figure 3 Estimated adult imprisonment rates by jurisdiction, 2003-04.

#### **Sentenced Prisoners**

On 30 June 2004, sentenced prisoners represented 82% of those in custody, of these 37% had a sentence of less than 12 months.

Sentenced prisoners represented 63% of the receptions and 82% of the daily average number of prisoners in adult correctional institutions during 2003-04.

The average sentence length for sentenced prisoners received in custody (excluding prisoners with life sentences) during 2003-04 was 280 days. The median sentence length was 121 days, a reduction of 33% from last year's median of 180 days.

The average sentence length for sentenced prisoners held in custody (excluding prisoners with life sentences) during 2003-04 was 510 days. The median sentence length was 182 days, a reduction of 24% from last year's median of 241 days.

The average sentence length for sentenced Indigenous prisoners held in custody was 430 days.

#### Offence

The most common offence<sup>3</sup> for prisoners held in custody on 30 June 2004 was assault (33% of prisoners), followed by break and enter (11% of prisoners).

#### **Last Known Address**

The Darwin region continues to be the most common last known address for prisoners in custody. As at 30 June 2004, 34% of prisoners in custody (244) had a last known address in that region.

#### Indigenous Status

The daily average number of Indigenous prisoners in custody during 2003-04 was 570, which represented 79% of the total daily average.

On 30 June 2004, there were 555 Indigenous prisoners in custody in an adult correctional institution in the Northern Territory, which represented 78% of total prisoners.

From the figure below, the estimated rate of imprisonment of Indigenous adults in the Northern Territory was 1,688 persons per 100,000 Indigenous adults, which is less than the national average of 1,950 persons per 100,000 Indigenous adults.




Figure 4 Estimated adult Indigenous imprisonment rates by jurisdiction, 2003-04.

The estimated Northern Territory non-Indigenous rate of imprisonment was 136 per 100,000 non-Indigenous adults<sup>4</sup>.

#### Age

The average age of prisoners received into custody during 2003-04 was 31 years. There were eight prisoners received into custody who were aged 60 years or older, with the oldest prisoner aged 64 at reception.

#### Sex

On 30 June 2004, there were 16 female prisoners in custody, which represented 2% of the Northern Territory prison population. In 2003-04, there were 52 sentenced female receptions, a 13% reduction compared with the previous year (60).

The average daily number of adult females in custody during 2003-04 was 19, which was lower than the previous year (22).

The figure below shows that Northern Territory female imprisonment rate has steadied after the dramatic fall in 1999-00. The estimated rate for the first three quarters of 2003-04 was 27 per 100,000 adult females. The estimated Australian rate for the same period was 19 per 100,000 adult females. During the first three quarters of 2003-04, the average daily proportion of females in the Northern Territory prison population was 2.6%, which is noticeably lower than the national average of 6.5% for the same period<sup>5</sup>.




Figure 5 Estimated adult female imprisonment rates, 1998-99 to 2003-04.

#### **Marital Status**

On 30 June 2004, 45% of the prisoners had stated at the time of their reception into custody, that they were married.

#### **JUVENILE DETAINEES**

#### **Population**

As shown in the figure below, there has been considerable fluctuation in the annual daily average number of detainees in custody in juvenile detention centres over past years.

Figure 6 Yearly daily average juvenile detainees from 1988-89 to 2003-04.

Note: prior to June 2000, 17 year olds were classified as adults.

The daily average number of detainees held in custody during 2003-04 was 16, which is lower than the previous year (24).

The estimated detention rate for the Northern Territory is 64 per 100,000 juveniles aged between 10 and 17 years<sup>6</sup>.

The minimum number of detainees held in custody on any day during the year was eight and the maximum was 29.

#### **Receptions and Sentence Status**

There were 183 receptions into juvenile detention centres in the Northern Territory in 2003-04, which involved 126 distinct juveniles.

Most juveniles are unsentenced at the time of reception into a detention centre. However, during an episode a detainee may commence several types of orders. Thus during 2003-04, there were 200 distinct order commencements consisting of 169 remand order commencements (including holding orders), 30 detention order commencements and 1 fine default order commencement.

The daily average number of sentenced detainees during 2003-04 was seven.

#### Offence

The most common offences<sup>7</sup> for juveniles received into detention during 2003-04 were property offences (56% of all receptions).

#### **Indigenous Status**

During 2003-04, 151 (83%) of the 183 juvenile receptions involved Indigenous detainees.

#### Age

Of the 126 distinct detainees who commenced at least one episode in a juvenile detention centre during 2003-04, most (75%) were in the 15 to 17 year old age group at first reception.

#### Sex

Most of the detainees received into a juvenile detention centre were males. Only four (2%) of the 183 receptions were for female detainees.

#### FOREIGN NATIONALS AND FEDERAL PRISONERS

Foreign nationals are often held in Northern Territory correctional institutions and are usually included in the counts as non-Indigenous. The yearly daily average number of foreign nationals reached a peak of 145 in 2000-01.

Between 1999-00 and 2002-03, the majority of foreign nationals held in Northern Territory correctional institutions were classified as people smugglers. People smugglers are non-Australian citizens in custody for federal 'people smuggling' offences<sup>8</sup>. There was a rapid increase in the number of receptions of people smugglers during the 1999-00 financial year. During the period 1999-00 to 2001-02, people smugglers represented a significant proportion of the total custody population and a large proportion of the non-Indigenous custody population. The yearly daily average number of people smugglers reached a peak of 122 in 2000-01. Since then it has been decreasing.

#### **Adult Prisoners**

On 30 June 2004, there were 27 foreign nationals in custody in an adult correctional institution, representing 4% of the total adult prison population. Of these, four were 'people smugglers', two of which were sentenced.

During 2003-04, 121 foreign national adults were received into a correctional institution. This represents a 17% increase from the previous year (103).

#### **Juvenile Detainees**

On 30 June 2004, there were no foreign national juveniles in custody in a correctional institution.

During 2003-04, 12 foreign national juveniles were received into a correctional institution.

#### **COMMUNITY CORRECTIONS PROGRAMS**

#### **Program Caseload**

As at 30 June 2004, the Community Corrections program caseload consisted of 1,585 adult programs and 294 juvenile programs. Of these, 1,455 programs were for conditional liberty orders. The remaining 424 programs were for clients in custody and were pre-parole or pre-probation programs, or life-sentenced prisoners who were receiving services from community corrections officers.




Figure 7 Community Corrections program caseload from 1998 to 2004.

#### Commencements

During 2003-04, there were 1,317 conditional liberty commencements, an increase of 12% from the previous year. Of these, 36% (474) were for community work orders.

#### Offence

The most common offence<sup>9</sup> varied according to the type of program. Break and enter offences were the most common type of offence for community work orders and driving offences were most common for home detention program commencements.

#### **Indigenous Status**

Indigenous people represented 79% of the conditional liberty program commencements.

#### Age

The majority (1,062 or 81%) of conditional liberty program commencements was for adults. The average and median age for distinct persons who commenced a conditional liberty program during 2003-04 was 26 years and 24 years respectively. The youngest person to commence an order was 10 years and the oldest was 65 years.

#### Sex

Ten percent of the conditional liberty program commencements were for females.

#### OVERVIEW OF PERFORMANCE

This part of the report is committed to reporting the activities and progress of the Division against the five key focus areas, which are described in detail in the Business Plan:

- Containment
- Supervision
- · Offender Rehabilitation and Reintegration
- Reparation
- Advice to Sentencing Authorities

#### **PERFORMANCE**

The following table contains information produced by the Steering Committee for the Review of Commonwealth/State Service Provision (SCRCSSP) contained in the 'Report on Government Services, 2004', which compares service delivery performance in Australia. Each jurisdiction provides standard information by which comparisons can be made. For corrective services, performance is categorised according to efficiency or effectiveness. Key focus areas mentioned above are addressed by at least one indicator and a selection of summary indicators are presented in the following table.

The information presented in the following table for other jurisdictions is for 2002-03, which is the most recent period in which this information is available. The Agency uses many of the findings from this exercise to establish benchmarks for its own business planning exercises.

In many instances, the Northern Territory differs from other jurisdictions. These unique characteristics include the small general population of which a high proportion is comprised of Indigenous persons, dispersion of the population and remoteness, which results in higher costs for goods and services and the physical location of the Northern Territory in comparison to other states.

It should also be noted that some of the indicators used in the following table might differ from those used elsewhere in this Annual Report. This may be due to differences between jurisdictions in accrual or cash accounting processes and the exclusion of juvenile justice from the SCRCSSP exercise.

As can be seen, the Northern Territory compares reasonably with other jurisdictions in most of the performance indicators mentioned above. In the past few years, the measure of recidivism has been seen to be a partial measure of the whole justice system, not just correctional system. It is recognised that the rates of recidivism is partially determined by many factors outside the justice system, including education, employment and social conditions. The measures of recidivism used are limited in that they do not consider the types of re-offending, only follow a person within the same jurisdiction in which they completed the original corrections program and do not include any offences which result in an outcome not administered by correctional services (e.g. fines, bonds and suspended sentences).
